Syllabus

Under Semester System

The University shall offer PGDWS degree in the faculty of Social Sciences. The Post-Graduate Diploma programme in Women's Studies will be of one year duration i.e., two Semesters and shall be designated as Post-Graduate Diploma in Women's Studies, abbreviated as PGDWS. The PGDWS programme shall consists of a total 08 papers of 5 credits each. Each academic session shall have two semester (July-December) and (January-June). The students will be evaluated through Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA), End-Semester Examination (ESE)/Project Work evaluation and the teaching will be structured accordingly.






