

#### ORDINANCE

#### PREAMBLE:

The CBCS provides an opportunity for the students to choose courses from the prescribed list of courses comprising core, elective and ability enhancement courses. The courses can be evaluated following the grading system, which is considered to be better than the conventional marks system. Therefore, it is necessary to introduce uniform grading system in the entire higher education in India. This will benefit the students of universities of Bihar to move across institutions within India to begin with and across countries. The uniform grading system will also enable potential employers in assessing the performance of the candidates. The Universities shall follow the guidelines formulated by the UGC in order to bring uniformity in evaluation system and computation of the Cumulative Grade Point Average (CGPA) based on student's performance in examinations.

The Postgraduate degree course for subjects under Faculty of Humanities shall be of four semesters spread over two years duration. The course shall be named as the 'Master of Arts' course and shall be abbreviated as M.A.

#### General

- 1.1 The ORDINANCE and the REGULATIONS shall be called the 'Admission Ordinance' and 'Regulations of Examination' for Post-Graduate degree courses to be applicable in the Universities of Bihar.
- 1.2 These ordinance and regulations shall be effective from the academic session 2018-19.
- 1.3 The M.A. Course shall consist of 20 papers spread over four semesters consisting of Core Courses (CC), Elective Courses (EC), Discipline Specific Elective Courses (DSE), Ability Enhancing Courses (AEC) and Ability Enhancing Compulsory Courses (AECC) as described in Table. 2. There shall be five courses/papers in first semester, six courses/papers in second semester, six courses/papers in third semester and three courses/papers in fourth semester; each course carrying 100 marks The entire curriculum shall be of 2000 marks taken together. However, the CGPA/class shall be awarded on the performance of the candidate on 16 papers which includes the 14 CC papers and two EC papers having an aggregate of 1600 marks. The various types of courses under CBCS is defined in section 3.

3. OUTLINE OF THE CHOICE BASED CREDIT SYSTEM (CBCS) for PG degree courses:

It consists of a number of courses i.e. Core Course (CC), Elective Course (EC), Discipline Specific Elective Course (DSE), Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC), and Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC), Each course is equivalent to a paper. The nature of these courses are defined below.

### 3.1.1 Core Course (CC):

A course which should compulsorily be studied by a candidate as a core requirement on the basis of subject of MA studies and is termed as a Core course.

### 3.1.2. Elective Course (EC):

Generally a course which can be chosen from a pool of courses (Basket) and which may be very specific or specialized or advanced or supportive to the subject/discipline of study or which provides an extended scope or which enables an exposure to some other subject/discipline/domain or nurtures the candidate's proficiency/skill is called an Elective Course.

# 3.1.3 Discipline Specific Elective Course(DSE):

Elective courses may be offered by the main discipline/subject of study is referred to as **Discipline Specific Elective**. The University/Institute may also offer discipline related Elective courses of interdisciplinary nature (to be offered by main discipline/subject of study).

### 3.1.4 Generic Elective (GE) Course:

An elective course chosen generally from an unrelated discipline/subject, with an intention to seek exposure is called a Generic Elective.

P.S.: A core course offered in a discipline/subject may be treated as an elective by other discipline/subject and *vice versa* and such electives may also be referred to as Generic Elective.

# 3.1.4 Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC):

The Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) / Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC). "AEC" courses are the courses based upon the content that leads to life skill enhancement.

# 3.1.6 Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses(AECC): (Qualifying and Non-CGPA course):

University will run a number of Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses(AECC) which is qualifying in nature and student from all faculties have to qualify in all courses.

# 3.1.7 Dissertation/Project/ Internship/ Industrial Training:

An elective course designed to acquire special/advanced knowledge, such as supplement study/support study to a project work, and a candidate studies such a course on his own with an advisory support by a teacher / faculty member is called dissertation/project.



IMP: It is desirable that all students of all courses be given adequate exposure over and above the class room teaching to enhance the scope of employability.

3.2.1. The distribution of the six elective papers shall be - two EC, one DSE or one GE, two AECC, one AEC. Students may opt for any elective course out of a list of elective papers (Basket) offered by the parent department or any other department/s as per his/her choice with the prior permission of the parent department. The list of elective

papers, syllabus and prerequisite of the elective course will be as decided by the Board of Courses of Studies (BOCS) of the concerned subject/ department.

- 3.2.2.The final CGPA/ class will be decided on the performance of the student in the 16 courses/ papers including the 14 Core Courses (CC) / papers and two EC /papers.
- 3.2.3 The one DSE or one GE, two AECC, one AEC papers will be qualifying in nature and a student has to score at least 45% marks in these papers. Grade will be awarded separately for these courses, however, performance in these elective courses/ papers will not be considered for awarding the final CGPA/ class.

# 3.2.4 Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses(AECC):

University will run two Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC) which are qualifying in nature and student has to qualify in both these courses. The courses are:

AECC-1: Environmental Sustainability (3 Credit) &Swachchha Bharat Abhiyan Activities (2 Credit)

AECC- 2: Human Values & Professional Ethics (3 Credit) & Gender Sensitization (2 Credit)

Students will do assignments/project work related to institutional social responsibilities including Swachchha Bharat Abhiyan Activities during SEMESTER BREAK.

3.2.5 University will run a number of Ability Enhancement Courses (AEC) and Skill Enhancement Courses; a student can choose one from these. For example:



# 3.2.6 Discipline Specific Elective (DSE):

In each subject the CC/ paper -5 being taught in the second semester will be open to be selected as a DSE paper. In the first phase a student will be allowed to choose a paper from any subject other than his/ her Core Course (CC) from the same faculty in the same university.

University will run a number of Generic Elective Courses (GE); a student can choose one from these. For example:

- Any course run by any department


## 4. Admission to M.A. Part-I (First Semester)

- 4.1 A candidate seeking admission to M.A. (Semester System) must be a graduate having passed the Bachelor Degree (B.A.) with Honours in the subject concerned or as a subsidiary subject or as a subject in pass course or in an allied subject. Preference will be given to those having passed with the subject as a Hons Subject /Major subject/ Core Course.
- 4.2 In such subjects where candidates with Honours/ Subsidiary / Pass degree are not available, students having degree in allied subjects may be treated at par as having Honours Degree in the subject. Lists of allied subjects are enclosed as Annexure 1. The Academic Council of the University on the recommendation of its equivalence committee shall modify the lists of allied subject/subjects whenever needs arise.
- 4.3 For Patna University eighty (80%) of the total sanctioned seats of the subject concerned shall be reserved for the candidates having graduation degree from Patna University and the remaining 20% seats shall be open. The decision has been taken in view of the following observations:

"The academic calendar in Patna University is strictly followed and the session for both UG and PG courses are exactly on schedule, whereas in all other state universities in Bihar, the sessions for both U.G. and P.G. courses are late by two to three years. Therefore, it is reasonable to give opportunity to students graduated from Patna University to take admission in P.G. course in Patna University, otherwise the Patna University graduates have to wait for 2/3 years to continue their P.G. studies and suffer a break in the continuity of their academic carrier. This will lead to injustice to the students graduating from Patna University. Therefore, it is proposed that 80% seats be reserved for the students passing out from Patna University."

4.4 Admission to M.A. Part-I (First Semester), shall be made in order of merit. The merit list shall be prepared on the basis of marks obtained by the applicant in the Bachelor Degree Course or through Entrance test. Ruhawhy

In case of Entrance Test it will be organised by the University to be named as 'Name of the respectiveUniversity' - Postgraduate Entrance Test in the Faculty of Humanities abbreviated as example: PUPET/H. The merit list shall be prepared on the basis of marks obtained by the applicant in the PET/H to be organised by the respective University.

#### Eligibility Criteria 5.

- 5.1. The eligibility criterion for applying for admission in M.A. are as follows:-
  - (i) Passed the Bachelor degree(B.A.) with 45% marks in respective Honours subject/major subject/ core course

- (ii)Passed the Bachelor degree with 55% marks in Subsidiary/Pass course/Allied subject.
- 5.2 Admission to M.A. course will be taken on the basis of marks in the Bachelor Degree course or performance in PUPET/H.
- 5.3 Structure of the entrance test:

Questions shall be of multiple choice type with four options with a single correct answer. The entrance test shall be held on OMR sheet. The duration of the test shall be of 2:30 hour. The total marks will be 200 marks. There shall be no negative marking. There shall be two parts in the question paper as mentioned in Table.3.

5.4 The application fee for applying for admission to M.A. courses will be Rs.750/-only. This will include the fee for admission test (whenever applicable). On the recommendation of the Academic Council and with the approval of the statutory bodies of the respective university, application fee may be revised whenever required.

### 6. No. of seats

Any change in the number of seats in a particular subject shall be decided by the respective University in accordance with the guidelines received from the State Government from time to time.

# 7. Reservation of Seats

i. The reservation of seats in each course shall be as per reservation rules of the Government of Bihar. Pechanty Lastinini



ii. Reservation for Persons with Disabilities (PwD) candidates will be followed as per orders of the Government of Bihar issued from time to time.

iii. A maximum of two seats in each subject over and above the sanctioned seats shall be filled by applicants who have distinguished themselves in sports. Under this category only those applicants shall be considered who have represented their University/State in different disciplines at state/national level events.

iv.A maximum of two seats in each subject over and above the sanctioned seats shall be filled by applicants who have distinguished themselves in Fine Arts. Under this category only those applicants shall be considered who have represented their University/State in different disciplines at state/national level events.

v. Two seats shall be reserved for NCC-C Certificate holders. This reservation will also be over and above the normal sanctioned strength of the subject.

vi. Two seats shall be reserved for NSS Certificate holders representing University/ State. This reservation will also be over and above the normal sanctioned strength of the subject.

vii. Reservation for sons/daughters/ spouse of Military personnel/Defence Personnel will be followed as per provisions of the General Ordinance for Admission to Various Courses received from the Governor's Secretariat, Bihar, Patna vide its letter no.PU18/99-3944/GS(I) dated 28.8.1999. This reservation will also be over and above the normal sanctioned strength of the subject.

viii. Reservation for sons/daughters of the respective university teachers will be followed as per provisions of the General Ordinance for Admission to Various Courses received from the Governor's Secretariat, Bihar, Patna vide its letter no.PU18/99-3944/GS(I) dated 28.8.1999. This reservation will also be over and above the normal sanctioned strength of the subject.

ix. Reservation for sons/daughters of the respective university non-teaching staff will be followed as per provisions of the General Ordinance for Admission to Various Courses received from the Governor's Secretariat, Bihar, Patna vide its letter no.PU18/99-3944/GS(I) dated 28.8.1999. This reservation will also be over and above the normal sanctioned strength of the subject.

x.2% seats of the sanctioned strength in any subjects may be filled with NRI/Foreign students. These seats will be treated as over and above the normal sanctioned strength. NRI candidates under this category shall submit their applications duly recommended by M.E.A. (Ministry of External Affairs) alongwith the copies of the documents showing NRI status.

OBC/WBC etc. has to mention about the category at the time of submitting the main admission application form and attach the supporting document to substantiate his/ her claim.

Applications received separately later on shall not be entertained.

xii. A candidate seeking admission against seats under special quota as mentioned above [7.ii to 7.x] shall have to submit special quota application along with main admission application form and attach the supporting document to substantiate their claim. Applications received separately later on shall not be entertained.

xiii. No student shall be provided two weightage for the purpose of admission under special quota from 7.ii to 7.x.

- 8. No applicant shall be admitted to the course who has not applied for admission within the notified time period.
- The admitted students will have to register themselves with the Patna University to be able to appear in the Patna University examination within the stipulated period /at the time of admission.
- 10. No such applicant shall be admitted who, in the opinion of the Head of the Department and endorsed by the Vice Chancellor, should not be admitted in the best interest of the University.
- 11. During the tenure of the course, if it is found that any document/documents or submission made by a student in support of his/her admission to M.A. course is/are forged or fake, his/her admissions shall automatically stand cancelled. The concerned candidate shall be solely responsible for the cancellation of his/her admission and other punitive action/actions.
- 12. The Vice Chancellor of the respective University has the absolute right to reject /deny admission to any candidate without assigning any reason if he/she judges that this is in the best interest of the University.
- 13. No candidate shall be allowed to register for any other degree course in the same University or any other university during the same academic session of his/her study of M.A. under the subjects of the Faculty of Humanities.

## 14. Medium of Instruction/Teaching

Medium of instruction for teaching-learning and examination will be Hindi/English except courses on literature/ language. In courses on Language / literature will be decided by the BOCS.

#### 15. Fee Structure

The Fee Structure for the M.A. shall be as mentioned in Table 4.

16. If need arises, the University with the approval of relevant Statutory bodies and the Governor's Secretariat may modify / add or delete any provision of this ordinance.

Regulations for Examination of M.A. (Semester System) in the Faculty of Humanities, for Patna University.

#### 1. General

1.1 These regulations shall be called the "Regulations of Examination" for M.A. (Humanities).

1.2 These regulations shall come into force from the academic year 2018-2019.

2. Programme of Study

- 2.1 The University shall offer M.A. degrees in the following subjects in the Faculty of Humanities:
   Arabic, Bengali, English, Hindi, Maithili, Persian, Philosophy, Sanskrit, Urdu, Angika, Bhojpuri, Buddhist Studies, GandhianThought, Islamic studies, Magahi, Nepali, Pali, Music, Journalism & Mass Communication (Hindi), Journalism and Mass Communication (English), Journalism and Mass Communication (Urdu).
- 2.2 The durations of M.A. (Semester System) course shall be of four semesters spread over two academic years. Each semester shall be of ninety teaching days.

2.3 Each academic session shall consist of two semesters – I and III: from July to December and II and IV: from January to June.

- 2.4 The M.A. Course shall consist of 20 papers spread over four semesters. There shall be five papers in first semester, six papers in second semester, six papers in third semester and three papers in fourth semester carrying 100 marks in each paper. The entire curriculum shall be of 2000 marks taken together. However, the class shall be awarded on the performance of the candidate on 16 papers including 14 CC and two EC papers having an aggregate of 1600 marks.
- 2.5 In each semester each elective paper shall carry 100 marks. The fourelective papers one AEC, two AECC and one DSE or one GE will be qualifying in nature. A student shall not be considered pass and eligible for award of the final degree unless he/she obtains minimum qualifying marks in these four papers. A complete description of papers is given in table 1.

2.6 The distribution of papers like theory, practical, field work, project, internship, dissertation etc. with number of credits is specified in each subject in the course structure of the subject concerned of the department.

2.7 The term 'credit' means weightage given to a course in relation with the instructional hours assigned to it. One credit will generally consist of ten hours of instruction. The M.A. Humanities course shall be of one hundred credits dividedas 25credit in first semester, 30 credit in second semester, 30 credit in third semester and 15credit in four semester. The number of credit for each paper of the Master's degree programme shall be specified in the course structure of the subject concerned.

3. Evaluation of Performance Under Semester System

3.1 The performance of a student in each paper will be assessed on the basis of a Continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) of 30 marks and the End of Semester Examination (ESE) consisting of 70 marks.

3.2 The components of C.I.A. are follows:

(i) Two mid-semester written tests of one hour duration each = 15 Marks

(ii) Seminar/Quiz = 05 Marks

(iii) Assignment = 05 Marks

(iv) Punctuality and conduct = 05 Marks = 30 Marks

Total

3.3 The performance of a student in the elective papers AEC and AECC in each semester addressing the issues of i. Skill Development, ii. Human Values and Professional Ethics and Gender Sensitizationiii. Environment and Sustainability and Swachchha Bharat Abhiyan Activities shall be assessed on the basis of a continuous Internal Assessment (CIA) of 50 marks and the End Semester Examination (ESE) consisting of 50 marks.

3.4 The components of C.I.A. in these papersshall be as follows:

(i) One mid-semester written tests of one hour duration each= 10 Marks

(ii) Seminar/Quiz

(iii) Assignment

= 15 Marks

= 10 Marks

(iv) Discharge of Institutional Social Responsibility
/Community Services (report to be submitted) = 15 Marks

Total

= 50 Marks

3.5 The concerned teacher of the course/paper shall be responsible for conducting the mid-semester tests and other components of the CIA.

3.6 The ESE will be written examination examinations of 3-hours duration

conducted by the University.

3.7 The evaluation of laboratory paper and field work, wherever applicable will also be based on CIA and an end-semester practical examination.

3.8 All such examination shall be as per the provisions of examination board and moderation board of the Patria University.

3.9 Only those students who secured minimum qualifying marks in of 45% in the CIA shall be allowed to fill up the End Semester Examination form.

3.10 The marks of CIA in each paper be submitted by the Department along with the End semester Examination form failing which the student may not be issued admit card for the examination.

#### 4. Examinations:

4.1 The End-Semester-Examination will be conducted by the University. The Mid Semester examinations and other components of CIA shall be conducted and evaluated by the concerned departments. The practical examinations wherever applicable shall be conducted at the department. The Head of the department will appoint external examiner(s) for practical End Semester Examination with the approval of the University. Themid-semester tests will be conducted and

evaluated by the teacher concerned. The answer scripts of the mid-semester tests shall be shown to students by the concerned teacher.

- 4.2 The End of Semester Examination (ESE) shall be named as follows:
  - M.A. Part (I)-Semester I Examination and Semester II Examination respectively.
  - M.A. Part (II) Semester III Examination and Semester IV Examination respectively...
  - Syllabus for each paper shall be divided into at least 5 units. Based on this, the question paper pattern for the End Semester Examination shall have divided into three parts A, B, C comprising of objective type questions with multiple choice, short answer type questions and long answer type questions respectively as mentioned below:

- 4.3 In formulating the entire programme of studies, each Department shall be guided by the consideration that at the Postgraduate level, students should be familiar with all the sub-disciplines, trends and paradigms of the subject contributing to the knowledge pool and also the value education and employability factor. Keeping this in view the Department will decide subject based 14 core papers, 2 EC papers and other 4electivespapers.
- 4.4 Paper Setting: For ESE, 50% examiners will be engaged from outside the university by the parent University as per the provisions of the examination board.
- 4.5 In Subjects, where there is Practical/Project/Field Study/Internship/Dissertation etc. generally not more than 4-5 credits should be allowed for such papers in each semester. The distribution of marks for CIA and ESE for such papers shall be decided by the Board of Courses and Study (BOCS) of the respective subject with the approval of the University and details mentioned the syllabus for which 50 marks will be for CIA and 50 marks for ESE.
- 4.6 All practical papers shall be evaluated by two external examiners. The distribution of CIA marks in practical papers shall be as per the course structure.

### 5. Passing of Examinations and Promotions Rules Promotion Rules

- 5.1 There shall be no supplementary examination in any of the papers in any semester. (I, II, III and IV).
- 5.2 The candidates who have been admitted to the First Semester of a two year Postgraduate Programme in a session can be placed in the following categories on the basis of their attendance in the Semester.
  - (i) Those who have cleared the CIA and attended the required minimum percentage (75%) of attendance of lectures/practical classes separately.
  - (ii) Those who have not attended the required minimum percentage of attendance (75%) both in Theory and Practical shall in no case be permitted to appear in the End Semester Examinations.
- 5.3 After appearing at the Semester Examination, the candidates can be placed in following categories in the context of declaration of the results of the Semester Examination (ESE):
  - (i) To be declared passed in End Semester Examination in any subject, a candidate must secure atleast 45% marks in each paper separately in CIA, theory and practical, wherever applicable.
  - (ii) If a candidate secures 45% marks in atleast three papers in his/her First/Second/Third End Semester Examination he/she shall be promoted to next higher semester.
  - (iii) Candidates shall have to clear their backlog paper(s) in the next end semester examination of that semester whenever it is available.
  - (iv) Even if a student is promoted to Fourth Semester, his/her final result will only be declared when he/she has cleared all their backlog papers.

- (v) Final result of M.A. Course shall be published on the basis of candidate's performance in the 16 papers spread over four semesters provided he/she has passed with minimum qualifying marks of 45% in the elective papers of each semester.
- (vi) The Final result will be published only after he/she has cleared all the 21 papers securing minimum qualifying marks.
- (vii) Since it is a continuous evaluation programme, student shall be awarded Grade Point (GP) at the End of each Semester Examination and cumulative Grade Point (CGP) at the End of Final End Semester Examinations in 10 point scoring system.
- (viii) There shall be no supplementary examination. A student has to score minimum 45% marks in his CIA. Failing to secure minimum marks he/she shall have to repeat the CIA along with the students of the same semester of the next academic session.
- (ix) If students fail to secure minimum 45% marks in CIA of any paper his/her result will be declared as failed in that paper. Students shall have to reappear in that paper in the same semester of next academic session.
- (x) The name of the promoted candidate/candidates will not be included in the merit list of that subject.
- (xi) A promoted candidate, if he has passed in CIA but fails in theory paper/papers, he/she shall retain his/her CIA score and will reappear in the theory paper only of the semester whenever available. However, if a candidate is declared fail in any End Semester Examination, shall retain nothing and will have to redo the course work of failed semester again and he has to appear again in CIA as-well-as theory paper.

# 6. Improvement of Result :

If candidate passes in End Semester Examination (ESE), he/she may apply for the improvement of his/her result in maximum of two papers of the fourth semester. He/she can avail this facility only in theory papers. Better of the two results will be treated as final result of candidates in those papers.

However, the name of such candidates with improved result will not be included in the merit list.

#### 8. Examinations:

8.1 The End Semester Examinations (ESE) shall be conducted by the University. The continuous Internal Examinations (CIA) shall be conducted by the concerned department.

#### 9. Passing of Examination:

- 9.1 A student shall be declared to have 'passed' and promoted to the next semester when he/she earns 'B' grade or above grade as mentioned in the table in section 7 in the semester examination covering continuous evaluation, midterm and end-term examinations in all the courses for which he/she was registered in the said semester.
- (i) In order to be promoted from Semester I to Semester II, a candidate has to pass in at least three papers in Semester I Examinations.
  - (ii) In order to be promoted to the Semester III, a candidate needs to pass in at least three papers of Semester I and three papers of Semester II.
  - (iii) In order to be promoted to the Semester IV, a candidate must clear all papers of semester I, atleast three papers of semester II and three papers of semester III.
- (iv) In Semester IV, a candidate needs to have cleared all the twentypapers for the award of the Degree.
- (v) A Student passed or promoted to the next Semester shall be entitled to get admitted in the Semester to which he/she has been declared passed/promoted.
- 9.2 A student will be deemed as 'FAILED' in a semester when he/he gets 'F' grade in more than 50% of the papers offered in the examinations to meet the requirements. Such students will be advised by the University to repeat the semester on payment of semester fee or the half of the academic year fee.
  - 9.3 A student who has secured less than 'B' GRADE in one or more course may also be promoted to the next semester if he/she has not otherwise failed as per section above. However, he/she will have to re-appear at the examination of such courses one time only as and when it is held or at the time of regular End-semester examination (ESE) in which he/she has been promoted.
    - 9.4 A student shall be declared to have failed in the programme when he/she fails to qualify for promotion to the next semester after two successive attempts.
    - 9.5 Grades that may be shown in the award sheet of a student without any numerical value are N.A (Not Applied) and S.P (Satisfactory Performance) for course(s) extending beyond a semester such as Project Work.
    - 9.6 There shall be a Grade Point Average (GPA) calculated for each semester on the basis of grades obtained in that semester. The GPA for the Jth Semester is calculated as:
