There will be four semester in this course. The duration of each semester was be six months. I & III semesters will start from July in each year, II & IV semesters January. Examination will be conducted in November or December and May in each year respectively. There are four papers (of 5 credits; each credit of 10 hours) to studied in every semester. Each paper carries 100 marks (70 for university write examination and 30 for internal assessment). Each paper will be divided into five until the three groups in each paper. Group A contains ten question of 20 marks will be compulsory and must be answered two questions from unit. Group B contains the questions of 20 marks in which for questions will be answered, and one questions the from each unit. Group C contains three questions of 30 marks out of for carrying 10 marks each. One question must be answered from each unit.
